

Andrea Di Maio obtained in 1988 a MA at the University “La Sapienza” of Rome in 1988; in 1995 a PhD at the Pontifical Gregorian University (where he also attended courses of Theology); a PhD at the Catholic University “Sacro Cuore” of Milan in 1997. He specialised in Thomistic Lexicography under the supervision of Roberto Busa SJ, in (Christian) Philosophy under the supervision of Peter Henrici SJ, and in Medieval Philosophy under the supervision of Alfonso Maierù and Alessandro Ghisalberti.

Since 1988 he has been teaching at the Gregorian University, where since 1998 he is Extraordinary Professor of “Introduction into Philosophy” in the Faculty of Philosophy; for several years he also directed the School of Lexicography and Hermeneutics and the Curriculum of Christian Philosophy.

He was several times invited as a visiting professor at the Franciscan Pontifical University “Antonianum” and at the Pontifical Athenaeum “Regina Apostolorum” of Rome.

Since 2000, he has been also teaching Philosophy and History at part time in the Italian government secondary schools.

He published five scientific books and almost a hundred papers, mainly on Latin Scholastic Lexicography and Christian Philosophy. In the last years he has concentrated his research on the Bonaventurian thought. He was on the organizing and scientific committee of the International Bonaventurian Congress of Rome in 2017 (“Deus summe cognoscibilis”), whose proceedings were published by Peeters in 2018.

His recent publications regard the role of Holy Scripture, the Tree of Life, the Natural Right, the threefold Mind, the structure of the *Itinerary* and several other aspects of Bonaventurian Thought.
